Course Objectives

- The purpose of this course is to provide foundational knowledge for graduate studies, forming a basis for further proficiency in each of the areas covered in the course.

- *Be able to use the library resources to find and access appropriate scientific literature.*
- *Understand the importance of ethics, and the various ethical principles required in the conduct of research.*
- *Be able to contribute to development of a IRB or IACUC proposal.*
- *Be able to effectively present their research in the venues required of first and second year graduate students: journal clubs, committee meetings, and in abstracts.*
- *Be able to explain the basic components of a grant and the review process.*
- *Be able to prepare a personal statement and biosketch.*
